By-Law No. 53 Feb. 20, 1854

- Liquor licenses are now ten pounds

By-Law No. 55 Mar. 27, 1854

- Fines may not exceed 5 pounds but may not be less than four pounds and the price of prosecution will also be levied against the guilty party

1855

- James Stevenson elected as new Tavern Inspector

By-Law No.74 Feb. 24, 1855

- Application form for both Tavern licenses and shop licenses

By-Law No. 76 Feb. 24, 1855

- Andrew Hamilton now responsible for prosecuting those who have broken "any rule, regulation or By-Law" in regards to the sale of "wine, brandy or other spirituous liquors" as well as ale and beer
- He will receive a sum of one pound per prosecution

By-Law No. 82 Mar. 27, 1855

No fine shall exceed 5 pounds but no fine may be less than 5 shillings

Feb. 10, 1862

- Petition to readjust the price of wholesale liquor licenses as stated in the new By-Law

By-Law No. 179 Jan. 19 1863

- \$177 paid to Arnprior by McNab for the Tavern and Shop license collected for the year from the municipality of Arnprior

Sept. 27, 1864

 Petition of Jas. E. Cuthbert requesting a license to sell spirituous liquors in his shop in White Lake

By-Law No.6 Mar. 13, 1876

- \$70/tavern license \$150/shop license
